

NAPSF Member Spotlight: Omaha Public Schools Foundation

Dear Nebraska Association of Public School Foundation (NAPSF) Friends - When I started to think about the impact of Covid 19 on our industry at the beginning of March, I'm certain there would have been no possible way to predict what was to come. At the Omaha Public Schools Foundation, we operate the parent-pay before and after school childcare program in 42 elementary schools and seven parent-pay early childhood classrooms. When our Districts correctly and bravely did not return students to the buildings in March to protect everyone's health, those of us who generate "revenue" from the parent-pay program in the Omaha metro area found ourselves in a unique position. It set into motion a wave of concern about what would be the next steps to keep 181 part-time qualified childcare employees and 21 full-time staff on payroll. We wanted to honor our commitment to pay staff just as Districts have done the same. Through our leadership meetings, finance committee calls and emergency board strategic planning zoom calls we applied for the CARES Act SBA Loan and started down a path to revise our business model and immediately cut budgets.

We are doing this at a time when we are also focusing on serving our students in need in a variety of ways. 23,000 meals are being disbursed a week from Nutrition Services at various schools throughout our District. Families who have never needed assistance from the Food Bank for the Heartland, or rent/utilities/cable help in order to stay in their homes, are searching for relief. Now our communities are faced with the slow process of returning to workplaces, shopping in person, getting haircuts, congregating in the parks - with the expected concern that it is possibly too soon.

But what about the parents/guardians who could not stay home in the first place? Our first responders, health care providers, meat packing employees, grocery store employees or restaurant staff who are trying to keep their businesses alive through "take out" continue to make sacrifices each and every day.

The one thing I can attest to is that parents have never admired teachers MORE than they do now after home schooling their children for the last several weeks. And, those are the parents who can do it, so many either don't have the capability or the technology.

Our colleagues across the country are facing the same struggles as we are having here in Nebraska. The new underlying question is...will students return to the buildings in August? Will all of our students then have the same equitable access to technology and internet? In our District - these are pending questions and our Superintendent is tirelessly working to ensure that e-Learning is in place if a second or third wave of Covid hits our area. It's far too early to predict. All we can do is try to ensure that we are taking the appropriate precautions and following the recommendations of the CDC to protect ourselves and our families. AND - make sure we have a plan in place for the fall and beyond.

So, as we prepare for the school year to come to its natural conclusion and as our students finish two and half months of likely their first real experience of e-Learning, we must remember that we are all in this together. Lean on the NAPSF, the National Schools Foundation, colleagues in our field, colleagues in the District and partners in your community. And most of all - here's to the Class of 2020! May they find great success down their future paths and remember the impact of their education (and their K-12 Education Foundation) somewhere along the way.

Grand Island Regional Meeting Feedback



Friends I know many of you offer college scholarships to graduating seniors in your district. If you are like the Grand Island Public Schools Foundation, you were right in the middle of your scholarship process when school was moved to an online environment.

In our case, luckily, the students had finished their applications and the review was already complete. We had to fumble through the allocation process via zoom and figure out how to offer and award scholarships electronically. Although challenging, it was achievable.

The next step is to celebrate. In a typical year, we host several scholarship receptions where donors and students can meet and visit. These are always joyous days that really fill the bucket for donors, students and families. In most cases this year, we had to cancel these receptions.

There was however, one exception. At the Grand Island Public Schools Foundation we offer every student who graduates Summa Cum Laude or Magna Cum Laude a scholarship of at least \$500. These scholarships are awarded at an Academic Honors Night complete with a dessert reception and students addressing the audience regarding their future plans. This reception and presentation seemed non-negotiable. We couldn't take that away from the Class of 2020. So...we put our heads together.






Tuesday, May 5, 2020, 1:00 PM - Employee Giving From Start to Success
